Daily Advancement – Masonic Aprons







The wearing of an apron is a time immemorial tradition and takes its rise from operative stonemasons who would wear aprons to protect their clothing a body in the work place and also white gloves to protect themselves from the lime—an early form of Health & Safety if you like.

Aprons were traditionally made from lambskin and is symbolic of peace, innocence and friendship. More importantly in modern masonic terms, the modern apron is the badge of membership for Freemasons. The design of the aprons you see today were set in 1825, and become more elaborate as you progress through the ranks of freemasonry.

There are three degrees in Freemasonry with an apron representing each degree.

The first is an **entered apprentice** who would wear a plain white apron, originally lambskin, pure white without fault or stain, representing innocence and purity of heart.

The second is what is known as a **Fellow Craft** and is now adorned with two rosettes or an immortal rose said to represent the dual nature of man, the Jekyl & Hyde Complex. Incidentally the writer of that book, Robert Louis Stevenson was also a Freemason.

The third degree is the **Master Mason**, now with three rosettes, said to signify the 'The Body', 'The Soul' and 'The Spirit', a Trinity now complete and in the form of a triangle now surrounded by a blue border representing a greater light, such as knowledge.

The aprons become more elaborate the higher and more experienced you become in Masonry, for example the dark blue you see in lodge marks out officer's of Provincial Grand Lodge and the even more elaborate of Grand Lodge.

The design of the aprons differ around the world but are variations of the same and have similar symbolism. In England for example the aprons are worn over the jacket in lodges and in Scotland and Ireland under the jacket as they say working masons take off their jackets before putting on their aprons.

Despite these differences the one thing that unites us is our regard of the apron as an honourable garment and one of which we treasure.
